Dear CSS community,

It has already been a very busy spring at CSS, and there is lots of news to report:

➤ Our 6th and 9th grade admissions are complete and our new families are on the way: June 4th is the orientation for 6th graders and their parents, and June 27 is for incoming high school students.

> Students have had visits from amazing speakers, including Jeffrey Sachs, head of Columbia University's Earth Institute and advisor on sustainable development to the UN; and Brian Greene, physicist extraordinaire. CSS physics students observed demo physics projects at Columbia University (see photo below).



CSS has been in the news, with Senior Kiambra Griffin named scholar athlete on NY1; philosophy teacher Diana Senechal appearing on BBC World's The Forum; the school being featured in Urban Advantage's 10th Anniversary celebration at AMNH, and our earth week celebration getting recognized in the citywide sustainability newsletter.

➤ Our own *Robotics First* team competed at the Javitz Center and a visiting robotics team from Japan brought a jumping robot penguin for an expo you had to see to believe.

The PTA hosted two wonderful out-

of-school social events and the middle school student government put on an inschool Cabaret Night.

CSS students participated in a model UN at Columbia University, the NY AIDS walk, the D5 STEM EXPO and a release party for the philosophy journal.

A team of students, teacher, parents and guests launched the first-ever CSS International Week, featuring in-class country presentations, an after-school student roundtable and spectacular school wide international decorations.

➤ We have seen the administration of the state tests, the Advanced Placement exams and the new city assessments.

➤ Though we lost two math teachers for personal reasons, CSS teachers stepped up to fill in for the 9th grade. After weeks of searching, we have a stable teacher for 7th grade.

➤ With the Washington Heights YM/YWHA, we completed a major grant for afterschool activities to defray the costs of next year's electives program and bring new choices such as music, swimming, theater, tutoring and more!

> Professor Jay and his team of faculty advisors put together a beautiful National Honor Society ceremony for our inaugural chapter.

What does it all lead to? 100% of the Senior class applied to college and 100% were accepted to a 2- or 4-year college/university.
