

### March General Meeting Minutes (2022-2023)

### Location: ZOOM Tuesday, March 14, 2023 6:15PM to 7:30PM

### 1. Call to Order & Welcome

- Co-presidents Nydia Prishker and Leanne Gonzalez-Singer call meeting to order at 6:20p.m with 88 participants
- Muna Heaven served as Spanish interpreter and translated the meeting live on Zoom.

### 2. Approval of Minutes

- The link and QR code for minutes from last month's meeting were projected on screen for all those present to review.
- Co-Recording Secretary, Laurie Brown Kindred, summarized last month's meeting minutes.
- Motion to approve minutes from February meeting and minutes were approved with 100% participation.

### 3. Co-President's Report - Leanne Gonzalez-Singer

- Farewell and Congratulations Principal I.A. Lenice Nelson! Thank you for your service! She has been promoted to Student Services Manager for Community School District 5
- Welcome to our new Principal: Vikram Arora! Principal Arora started at CSS on Monday, March 13th, 2023 and previously worked as the Assistant Principal of Mathematics at Bronx Science.
- Communications Updates:
  - PTA Executive Board has emailed Superintendent Sean Davenport regarding the space issues at 425 West 123rd; the email mentioned that a new space is being vacated by another charter school that could serve as a possible relocation site for KIPP STARR; Supt. Davenport responded that he will elevate this issue to the Deputy Chancellor.
  - PTA Co-Presidents have contacted the NYPD requesting additional security (a temp guard was placed at security desk on Friday, March 10). Officer Pamela Lifesly admitted that there is a shortage of school security officers, but PTA is working on getting the position permanently filled.

### 5. WELCOME TO OUR NEW PRINCIPAL Mr. Vikram Arora

- Principal Arora introduced himself and described his background on getting into education as an instructor and then an administrator at Bronx Science (and talked through the improvements).
- CSS is the first school for which he sought the position of Principal and he is very happy to be a part of the CSS community! He talked about how he's filled with confidence as he talks to CSS teachers, and is open to communication and talking about problems (please make an appointment with his secretary). He discussed the need to be strategic and logical regarding space issues.

### 6. CSS DIPLOMA / COMMUNITY SERVICE - Bilingual High School Counselor, Elsa Cordoba

- Ms. Cordoba discussed the credit requirements and Regents requirements for four options for high school diploma (see table of graduation requirements in slide show attached below):
  - NYS Regents Diploma
    - Credit Requirements: 44 minimum required credits (every student must complete these REQUIRED credits: English, Social Studies & PE, plus 2 years of Foreign Language)
    - Assessment Requirements: 5 required Regents exams (65+ passing score) Math, Science, ELA Regents, Social Studies Regents (at CSS only give US History Regents), +1 regents exam (another Math, Science or LOTE, aka Spanish Regents)
  - NYS Advanced Regents Diploma
    - Credit Requirements: 44 minimum required credits (above NYS Regents Diploma plus 3 years of 6 credits of Foreign Language)
    - Assessment Requirements: 9 required Regents exams (above, plus 3 math -Algebra, Geometry and Trig; plus 3 Science exams - Living Environment, plus option to pick 2 of 3, Earth Science, Chemistry or Physics)
  - CSS Diploma (not required for graduation but consistent with CSS's curriculum):
    - Credit Requirements: 55 minimum required credits (above for NYS Advanced



### Regents Diploma plus 5 engineering and 5 philosophy)

- Assessment Requirements: 9 required exams + 1 College Course + 150 hrs of service (of which 100 hours must be from high school, 50 may be from middle school); Community Service hours must be submitted to Counselor Cordoba (community service hours are service that does not include compensation)
- NYS Local Diploma (for Students with IEPs who don't pass any of the above credit and/or assessment requirements)
  - Credit Requirements: 44 minimum required credits
  - Assessment Requirements: 5 required Regents exams (55+ passing score)

# 7. CSS COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY (CSS-CU) COURSEWORK - AP ERIN FLAHERTY - open to 8th - 11th graders now!

- CU College Edge (receive a transcript)
  - Credit-bearing; a "real" college course
  - Significant time commitment; meets multiple times per week and may have additional small discussion sections
  - Readings done outside of class; students need independence and socioemotional skills to seek office hours; TA support; etc
  - Students are in class alongside undergraduates
  - Summer College Edge is only for returning students
  - CU College Immersion (do not receive a transcript)
    - Non credit-bearing
    - Great entry point; great for summer
    - Lower time commitment (can be paired with other activities)
    - Highly engaging
    - Tailored towards high school students
    - High school students only
    - Summer Immersion is during the week; school year Immersion courses are on Saturday and Sundays
    - Geared to younger high school students
    - All classmates will be other high school students
- Application Process

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- Step 1: Students who meet GPA requirements are invited to apply to appropriate program (Edge, Immersion, both); application requires essay response; may reach out to Prof. Flaherty if questions about eligibility
- Step 2: Teacher committee evaluates students using CSS-CU rubric (attached in slide show below)
- CSS-CU committee reviews & scores student application responses
- Committee approves, approves conditionally, or disapproves student entrance to CU
- CU waives fees for College Immersion program; however waivers are limited and student may be waitlisted
- CU-College Edge does not have a specific cap
- Approved students are onboarded to CU (given CUID, connected to advisor etc)
- CSS has students apply well in advance due to multiple requirements from CU



for registration; because of this, the course catalog may not be available at the time of application; CSS advisor will help students register for appropriate courses when course numbers and times become available

- Success in the courses depends on a student's independence and initiative; the CSS-CU committee assesses these qualities in student applicants according to the score reference rubric sheet (attached in slides below); CSS encourages students to go through the application process themselves to demonstrate the qualities necessary for success
- Timely application is important because the courses fill up

# 8. Facilities Report - VP of Facilities, David Thom (email at PTAfacilities@columbiasecondary.org)

- Schoolyard is on track for completion sometime in Fall 2023 (which could mean December)
- School Construction Authority (SCA) has finally started scoping meetings on \$2.4M pool and \$500k basement cafeteria renovations. Has not shared a timeline.
- SCA is unclear on when roof repairs will start. Facade repairs are almost done. Scaffolding has been up more or less continuously for over five years but is hoping to remove it from W123rd in a couple months. (no additional information on timeline has been provided)
- Library and Tech Room construction are not complete; final "punch list" may require 1-2 more months. CSS's use of and access to the Library and Tech Room remains unclear (will there be a librarian? how will the books be acquired?); seeking clarification from the SCA.



• CSS comprises 56% of the building population but has been receiving only ~25% of shared space time periods. Process of working with other schools to better follow the DOE formula needs to be rebuilt from scratch.

• No news on converting W123rd into a Play Street. Application submitted last fall, DOT was supportive, but seems stalled. Lack of support from the three school admins may have been an issue (parking).



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**Facilities Report** 

Dave Thom, VP of Facilities

- Schoolyard is on track for completion sometime in Fall 2023
- SCA has finally started scoping meetings on \$2.4M pool and \$500k basement cafeteria renovations. Has not shared timeline.
- SCA is unclear on when roof repairs will start. Facade repairs almost done. Scaffolding has been up more or less continuously for over five years but hoping to remove from W123rd in a couple months.
- Library and Tech Room construction not complete yet. Still "punchlist" of 1-2 more months. Not clear on use the Library and Tech Room (will there be a librarian? how will the books be acquired?)
- CSS is 56% of building population but was receiving ~25% of shared space time periods. Process of working with other schools to better follow DOE formula needs to be rebuilt from scratch.
- No news on converting W123rd into a Play Street. Application submitted last fall, DOT was supportive, but seems stalled. Lack of support from the three school admins may have been an issue (parking).
